Make a Stained Glass Suncatcher



You will need:

- cut 2 pieces of sticky back plastic
- some pieces of black card to make a border
- some pieces of cellophane or tissue paper



Peel the backing off one piece of the sticky back plastic and lay it sticky side up, press the black pieces of card onto the plastic to make a frame.



Press coloured pieces of cellophane or tissue paper onto the plastic to fill in the gaps and create a picture or pattern.



Peel the backing off the second piece of sticky back plastic and stick it on top of the cellophane, fixing all the pieces in place. Trim around the edges.

Hang your stained glass up to the light or hold it near a window and see the colours shine through.

Stained Glass Suncatchers



All Saints Church, North Street in York has some of the most important displays of medieval stained glass in the British Isles.

The church is open most days, so you can drop in and view the stained glass.

In the stained glass you can find pictures of people, plants and animals.



Use the contents of your bag to make a suncatcher or stained glass window picture.

You could draw a picture onto tracing paper and colour it with felt pens. Hold it up against a window to see the light shine through.

You could stick cellophane and tissue paper to some sticky back plastic to make a suncatcher.
