HYBRID EVENTS

The programme includes a small number of hybrid events. These are presented in the same way as in-person ones, but include the in-person and online icons next to the theme tab at the top of an event (example above). ATTENDING EVENTS ONLINE

We use a variety of online and social media platforms to deliver online events. In order to watch talks live using Zoom technology, you need to download the free app/software.

Please also be aware that online sessions provide automated live-captioning that may not be 100 per cent accurate and can vary in quality.

In the case of hybrid events, you will have to indicate at booking whether you want to attend in person or online.





The StreetLife Hub is home to hands-on and immersive experiences created by community- and creativity-driven research to bring the multiple histories and creative spirit of Coney Street to life.

Use the past to think differently about the future and design your own high street, and be inspired by exhibitions of historic and contemporary print to try your hand at letterpress and linocut printing in our studio. 
TRAVEL TIPS
