#### TRAVEL AND TRANSPORT

Festival events are taking place at a wide range of venues across the city. You can plan your journey by public transport using the York Journey Planner at itravelyork.info/plan-journey. For those travelling to York by car, the planner also includes details of the city's six park and ride sites. Information on central York car parks can be found at york.gov.uk/parking. Parking facilities at venues outside the city centre will vary, so please see the venue's website for information.

Many of this year's Festival events are taking place on Campus East and Campus West at the University of York. First Bus runs a frequent service (bus numbers 66 and 67) between the city centre and the University. If travelling by car, parking on both campuses is free after 6pm and on weekends. 

Our Festival Focus sessions examine elections, wealth and poverty, and the science of sport. Other events highlight disability inclusion, food stories and politeness.



# Rendlesham Revealed: An East Anglian royal centre

In 2007, illegal metal-detecting alerted archaeologists to a site of exceptional importance at Rendlesham in south-east Suffolk – the 7th-century East Anglian royal centre mentioned by the Venerable Bede in his *Ecclesiastical History of the English People*. Archaeologist Christopher Scull of UCL guides you through the 15-year investigation which has revealed the largest and wealthiest settlement of its time known in England.
